#### Addendum to PRESIDENTS GONE WILD

I enjoyed seeing the pictures and reading the comments of other past presidents of the Philadelphia chapter. I was President after Joe Tozzi, having served as Secretary during his term. While I was in office (no 'reign'), the chapter outgrew our storefront basement on South 12th Street. We were drawing large crowds that completely filled the space, the stairs up to the street, and sometimes out onto the sidewalk. I went around center city looking for space to rent from some of the Protestant churches. This was during Cardinal Krol's reign, and to show you his power and influence, I was told by the head of the big Presbyterian Church on Chestnut Street that he was afraid of what "his friend Cardinal Krol would say if he rented us space." We did find space at the Episcopal Church on 24th Street, and were warmly welcomed to use their parish house hall, which also was used in part by a kindergarten. Ha! The problem was the next Sunday was our annual Anniversary Mass, and as was the custom then, we had champagne after. Our member who volunteered to clean up after our masses turned out to be a reformed alcoholic, and when he saw all the empty champagne bottles and glasses, he walked out, leaving a mess for the kindergarten teacher who used the space Monday morning. That day, I got a call from the pastor asking us what kind of services we were having! It was very embarrassing, but after he calmed down, he was gracious about it, and Dignity developed a very warm relationship with him. We met there for a few years, but it was a little out of the way, and when St. Luke's became available, the decision was made to move. We left 24th Street with a friendly letter from Father Temme, the Episcopal pastor, and as I remember, he attended our final Mass there.

### **DIGNITY PHILADELPHIA IN 1996**

This year seemed to bring the issue of lesbian/gay unions and domestic partner benefits to everyone's attention. Dignity joined the Philadelphia Freedom to Marry Coalition and began sending representatives to their meetings.

Chris Purdom, Coordinator of the Interfaith Working Group, met with both the Steering Committee and a chapter meeting to provide information on the work of the IWG which includes support for gay/lesbian rights as well as reproductive rights. The chapter was deciding on whether to join the IWG. The Steering Committee decided not to join the IWG but to work with it in support of gay/lesbian issues. IWG also kept us current on samesex marriage endorsements through their newsletter.

In early June, Mayor Edward Rendell signed an Executive Order to extend domestic partnership benefits to non-union city employees. This action caused a reaction from Cardinal Bevilacqua and set the tone for at least two more years. Our chapter president sent Dignity's view in a letter to Mayor Rendell which lead to a series of interviews and more letters in the electronic and print media.

The chapter continued its tradition that the first Sunday in Lent is Dignity's Day of Prayer and Fasting for AIDS Intentions. The social hour table consists only of water and a collection is taken for MANNA. Social events were celebrated at potlucks and the annual Christmas party.

Gather Comprehensive Hymnals went into use and were well received. A fundraising effort paid for all 150 hymnals and dedication plates were placed in the front of each one.

Dignity joined the high-tech era and approved taking \$2,000.00 from the Reserve Fund for the purchase of a computer and printer for the chapter's office.

Reverend Rodger Broadley, Rector of St. Luke's, was given an honorary membership in Dignity for the first time. The Spiritual Life Committee sponsored two retreats this year, one in Lent, conducted by Bob Waddington, and the other at Daylesford Abbey in the fall facilitated by Chris Hearn. Both retreat leaders are chapter members.

A Dignity/Mid-Atlantic Regional Meeting was held in August in Philadelphia. After business, the guest speaker was Regina Bannan, the Rising President of the National Board of The Women's Ordination Conference. The closing liturgy was cosponsored by WOC.

Jim Mallon distributed 2,000 copies of the booklet "Homosexuality: A Positive Catholic Perspective" at the National Catholic Educational Association Convention in the Pennsylvania Convention Center. The text was published in Baltimore by the Archdiocesan Gay & Lesbian Outreach (AGLO).

An ongoing relationship was started with the AIDS hospice, Calcutta House, at Christmas when our members brought gifts from wish-lists requested by each resident. The Lombard Street Community, a residence program of We the People, received a fully furnished room donated by the chapter and the Thanksgiving turkey drive was another success.

The second annual Art Auction was held in the fall to raise money to send representatives to the House of Delegates meeting of Dignity/USA in Boston in the summer of 1997.

**Motion 13-03-01:** Made by Dolores Vera; seconded by Jimmy Calnan. Be it moved that the April 50/50 be donated to Children's Crisis Treatment Center\*. Passed unanimously *[To honor Mary Louise Cervone, this motion was made to benefit her employer's agency, and will be made in her name]* 

**Motion 13-03-02:** Made by Jimmy Calnan; seconded by David Kalinowski. Be it moved that the Ad Hoc Committee for Elections 2013 be chaired by Dick O'Malley. Passed unanimously

**Motion 13-03-03**: Made by David Kalinowski; seconded by Kevin Davies. Be it moved that D/P sponsor a ½ page ad in the DUSA program booklet at \$250.00 and sponsor a liturgy at \$100.00. Passed unanimously

**Motion 13-03-04:** Made by Linda Barrett; seconded by Joe Toal. Be it moved that the Ad Hoc Committee for the Durkin Fund be chaired by Joanne Collins and includes Linda Barrett and Joe Toal. Passed unanimously

At the same time, we acknowledge that as archbishop and cardinal the man who is now Pope Francis has made some very harsh and inflammatory statements about lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people. We recognize that sometimes this new job on which he embarks can change the man called to it. We call on our new Pope to recognize that he is now head of a Church that includes a huge number of LGBT people, their families and friends around the world. We invite him to take the time to learn about our lives, our faith, and our families before he makes any papal pronouncements about us, and we stand ready to enter into dialogue with him at any time."
