THE DEFENDERS: A DIGNITY LEATHER CLUB

At the recent Dignity USA Convention in Washington, D.C., I attended a workshop on the Defenders, a leather group within Dignity USA. I had known about the Defenders because over ten years ago, a number of chapter members in Philadelphia had formed a club and even purchased leather outfits with the Defender logo on them. Unfortunately, the club soon became inactive before I could find out more about the organization.. I thought that the workshop would give me provide with the information which I had been seeking.

According to the literature which I received at the workshop, the Defenders is a club, affiliated with Dignity USA, for individuals, men and women, who want to “celebrate both their leather ‘lifestyle’ and their Christian spirituality.” They believe that “the leather experience can, when integrated and spiritually informed, actually produce a richer spirituality” for themselves and the Church. In other words, spirituality and sexuality can be integrated and are not mutually exclusive.

The Defenders were established in 1981 in New York City, and soon, by 1987, it was a national organization, from coast to coast, as far west as San Francisco. The clubs have also become noted for their charitable fund raising drives and activities. As a lead in to the chapter's 40th Anniversary in 2013, we are going to reprint in each monthly newsletter one year's fact sheet beginning with 1973 in this issue. We will try to include photos and copies of some of the documents mentioned in the reports. 1973 was reported in the May Newsletter, 1974 in June and 1975 in July.

“TAKING A CHANCE ON GOD: A BIOGRAPHY OF JOHN MCNEILL”

Four years ago, Dignity Philadelphia had a fund-raiser, hosted by Bill Wood, at his newly opened restaurant of Knock. Money was raised for the making of a film biography of John McNeill, one of the founders of Dignity and an icon in the GLBT community. His first and best known book, *The Church and the Homosexual*, has been translated into many foreign languages and continues to be an important book for those who want to find support in Bible for the integration of their sexuality and their spirituality. The producer of the film, “Taking a Chance on God: A Biography of John McNeill,” is Brendan Fay who earlier had made a well-known film on the life and death of Fr. Mychal Judge of 9-11 fame. “Taking a Chance” also tells a love story between John and his partner of forty years, Charles Chiarelli, who were recently married on Toronto, Charles’ home town.

The making of this film has been an odyssey all by itself. Since the expenses required for its production grew and grew, many thought it would never be made in John's lifetime. Not only was it made but it premiered last month in the annual Euro-Pride celebration in Rome! The USA premier took place in Washington, D.C. at Dignity USA's recent convention before a standing room crowd. At the conclusion of the film the audience rose in unison to acknowledge the power of the filmed biography. Before the hour-long film is released for general viewing, it will be submitted to film festivals throughout the country, including in John's hometown of Ft. Lauderdale in November. The wait was well worth it.

1976

On January 23, 1976, the Articles of Incorporation were approved by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and Dignity/Philadelphia was granted non-profit status as a foundation for religious, educational and charitable purposes within the meaning of Section 501© of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954. From May 28-30, the East Coast Regional Conference was held on the campus of the University of Pennsylvania. Approximately one hundred people were in attendance. It was a smashing success! Joseph Tozzi, elected for a second term as chapter President in March, presided at this conference. On June 12-13, Dignity/Philadelphia was well represented in the Philadelphia Gay Pride Weekend.

On August 3, 1976, during the Eucharistic Congress, a special liturgy was celebrated near the Civic Center while another special liturgy was being celebrated inside for priests and religious of the Archdiocese. The theme of the liturgy was “Freedom and Justice for Gay Catholics.” All the Philadelphia newspapers carried articles about this liturgy. The Archdiocese was shocked and concerned. On Sunday, October 17, weekly liturgies began being celebrated at Trinity Memorial Episcopal Church, 22nd and Spruce Sts. The church hall was rented for 7p.m. liturgy and 8p.m. social hour.

During October 21-23, Dignity was represented at the American Catholic Bishops' biannual meeting. Brian McNaught represented Dignity National. In a special document approved by the Bishops, it was recommended that the Church actively seek to serve the pastoral needs of those persons with homosexual orientation. The document gave special recognition to Dignity.

In November-December, 1976, the first Advent at Trinity Memorial Church Hall was celebrated. The attendance by this time had grown tremendously. For the first time a liturgy was celebrated by Dignity/Philadelphia on Christmas Eve, 1976.

You help to move the chapter forward by contributing and acting on major decisions proposed by the Steering Committee and members of the chapter. This representation on the Steering Committee requires 2 hours a month- the 1st Sunday of the month. And the rewards are numerous!
